





- 4. Organize and label any remaining items.



### Chicken and Wild Rice Soup

Need an easy and delicious recipe idea for dinner? Laura says, "I've been making this yummy soup. We even served it to our neighbors at a gathering last month, and it was a big hit!"

Prep Time: 20 minutes | Cook Time: 1 hour and 15 minutes | Serves: 8

#### **Ingredients:**

4 tablespoons unsalted butter

3 celery ribs, cut into 1/2-inch pieces

2 carrots, cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1 medium onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves, minced

1 1/2 teaspoons finely chopped thyme

Salt and Pepper

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup wild rice (5 ounces)

2 quarts chicken stock or low-sodium broth

2 cups water

4 cups bite-size pieces of roasted chicken or turkey

1 cup heavy cream

#### Directions:

In a large saucepan, melt the butter. Add the celery, carrots, onion, garlic, thyme and a generous pinch each of salt and pepper and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables just start to soften, about 10 minutes. Sprinkle the flour over the vegetables and cook, stirring, until evenly coated and lightly browned, about 3 minutes.

Add the wild rice to the saucepan and gradually stir in the chicken stock and water. Bring to a boil, then simmer over moderately low heat, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables are tender, about 30 minutes. Add the chicken and simmer, stirring occasionally, until the wild rice is tender, 10 to 15 minutes longer. Stir in the cream and season with salt and pepper. Ladle the soup into bowls and serve.

## Get Motivated with a School Librarian Game




Are you a bit overwhelmed at the thought of starting the second semester? Maintaining our libraries requires so much work, sometimes it's hard to know where to start!





# Winter Call Number Hunt For 3<sup>rd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> Grade Students


An engaging library call number activity + secret code decipher + silly riddle = ALL FUN!!






### **Snowman Building 101**


Use these slides and printables to teach about the required training and a variety of responsibilities that fall upon your school resource officer.







### The Reappearance of Rachel Price by Holly Jackson

### Combining Groundhog's and Valentine's Day Fun For students in K-1 and Grades 2<sup>nd</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup>


